» Pickleball - The Fastest Growing Amateur Outdoor Sport

I was introduced to this fun little sport this past summer when my husband and I, while camping with friends near Santa Barbara, found they'd rented an entire campsite just to set up as a pickleball court. "What in the world is pickleball?" I said. Because I'd never heard of it! So they proceeded to demonstrate. I remember thinking; the court is small, the ball is large and lightweight. And so my out-of-shape brain was like...I can totally do this.

And so they loaned us some racquets and we proceeded to laugh and play in the sunshine with the ocean breeze to keep us cool and good friends to explain the games intricacies. And while my husband and I sadly, haven't played since... we enjoyed it enough to purchase our own racquets over Christmas and look forward to reprising our role as the pickleball newbies this summer when we are again camping with these same set of friends.

The experience did have me wondering...where did this game come from? Why hadn't I ever heard of it? So of course I did some digging.

Can you believe pickleball has been around for nearly 60 years? It was conceived in 1965. After playing golf one weekend during the summer, Joel Pritchard, a congressman from Washington State and Bill Bell, successful businessman, returned to Pritchard's home on Bainbridge Island, WA to find their families sitting around with nothing to do. The property had an old badminton court so Pritchard and Bell pulled out some badminton equipment but couldn't find a set of rackets. So they improvised and started



playing with ping-pong paddles and a perforated plastic ball. At first they placed the net at badminton height (60 inches) and volleyed the ball over the net, but soon found that the ball bounced better on an asphalt surface and so the net was lowered to 36 inches. Everyone enjoyed the game as it was something the whole family could play together.

The following weekend, Barney McCallum was introduced to the game at Pritchard's home and between the three men – game rules were created. The first permanent pickleball court was built in the backyard of Pritchard's friend and neighbor, Bob O'Brian. Thus pickleball was born!

As to how they came up with the name, there are two stories and I tend to favor the latter. Pritchard's wife Joan started to the call the game pickleball because it reminded her of the pickle boat in Crew where oarsmen were chosen from the leftovers from other boats. However, according to Barney McCallum the game was named after Pritchard's dog Pickles.

It wasn't until 1972 that a corporation was formed to protect the creation of this new sport. And by 1984 the United States Amateur Pickleball Association (USAPA) was organized and the first rulebook published. USAPA continued to invest in staff infrastructure, eventually growing to 20 staff members.

Why the seemingly sudden explosion of Pickleball interest? Methinks media exposure has had something to do with it. In 2022, Pickleball was one of the hottest trends in the U.S. and has enjoyed several segments in the past with national and international segments on NBC's The Today Show, CNBC, BBC News, Live with Kelly and Ryan, and articles in media publications such as; The New York Times, Vanity Fair, Forbes, The Economist, USA Today and Sports Illustrated. 2022 also marked the year Pickleball was named by The Sports & Fitness Industry Association (SFIA) as the fastest-growing sport in America for the second consecutive year. That years Margaritaville USA Pickleball National Championships drew nearly 2,300 registered players with the professional players competing for \$150,000 in prize money.

So it's obvious that Pickleball is here to stay. But will it flourish in Floral Park? I for one hope the craze catches on here with Randi Igullden hosting (assuming we get enough participants) the 1st annual Pickbleball Tournament on Sunday March 16th. The event is supposed to take place from 10 am to 4 pm at the private courtyard at Gene Andres' house on Riverside. Let's cross our fingers that by the time you are reading this issue; that tournament has taken place to the delight of neighbors. And stay tuned for pics!





Mary got her start working as an administrative assistant for an author and motivational speaker. Overwhelmed at work, he began collaborating with her on writing and book projects. Mary didn't realize she was ghostwriting, "I just knew I could see connections where others couldn't." So she enrolled in the Ghostwriting Program at CSULB, where she discovered that where ghostwriters write the book for you; coaches help you write it yourself. After receiving her certification, she launched her business and never looked back! When asked what she loves about her work, Mary said, "I love writing, but I really love helping other people share their stories. People are so interesting. I never get tired of it."

DANIELLA KAGASOFF

(Heliotope Drive)

In a world where screens dominate our attention, Daniella Kagasoff, a senior at Mater Dei High School and the daughter of Rick and Barbie Kagasoff, is a beacon of inspiration for the children in our community, advocating for the joy of reading. With her passion for literature and a heart dedicated to

service, Daniella has spearheaded numerous book drives, making a significant impact on schools and libraries in Santa Ana.

Daniella's journey into the world of philanthropy began with a simple realization: books have the power to transform lives. As a student deeply engaged in her studies, particularly in AP US History, she understood the profound impact of knowledge and literacy. A personal connection with her teacher further fueled her desire to spread the love of reading beyond the confines of her classroom. "I've always believed that books are more than just words on pages," Daniella shares. "They provide a sanctuary, a place of refuge for young minds to explore, learn, and grow."

Driven by this belief, she took action. Organizing book drives became a passion project, a tangible way to engage with her community and foster a love of reading. Her efforts culminated in a remarkable event on October 7, where she rallied neighbors in Floral Park to donate over 700 books! Since then, her dedication has only grown, with over 1,500 books collected and distributed to local Santa Ana schools.

Daniella's commitment didn't stop there. Currently, she's focused

on collecting books for a new library, recognizing the importance of accessible resources for all members of our community. Her enthusiasm for this cause stems from a genuine desire to provide children with the same opportunities for growth and exploration that she experiences through books.

"Volunteerism has the power to shape us in profound ways," Daniella reflects. "It's not about grand gestures; even small acts of kindness can make a difference." For Daniella, the choice to prioritize books over social media or digital devices is clear. She sees literature as a gateway to empathy, understanding, and personal development—a sentiment she hopes to instill in others, especially young readers.

PAUL GULINO

(Flower Street)

Paul Gulino is an award-winning screenwriter and playwright. He is the author of *Screenwriting: The Sequence Approach* (2004), which has been adopted as a textbook at schools and universities around the globe, and *The Science of Screenwriting: The Neuroscience Behind Storytelling Strategies* (2018). In 2023, he contributed a chapter on the history of screenwrit-



As an adult, Sue became an educator, spending 14 years at Santa Ana Unified and many more in Orange. From kindergartners to eighthgraders, Sue left an indelible mark on the hearts and minds of students. Sue's connection to her community runs deep, with fond memories of Floral Park children flocking to the library, eager to lose themselves in books. Today, the library serves as a sanctuary for many, a refuge for those who seek solace in the written word. For some, it is their only connection to the wider community, their portal to knowledge and their gateway to opportunity.

Through The Friends of the Santa Ana Public Library, Sue has spearheaded initiatives to provide textbook scholarships, fund programs

(Ross Street) In the heart of Floral Park there's a Little Free Library that's become a beloved fixture and the first in Santa Ana, thanks to Diane Willis and her husband Bart. It all started nearly two decades ago when Diane fell in love with the concept of Little Free Libraries during a visit to Oregon. Bart, a skilled wood craftsman, built their very own library as a gift to his wife. What began as a simple wooden box has since grown to include a dedicated section for children's books.

Diane carefully curates the collection, ensuring each book meets

her standard before it finds its place on the shelves. Those that don't make the cut are kindly donated to other organizations. But perhaps what truly makes this Little Free Library special is the community it fosters. Bart recalls the early days when Michael Houston would come by the library with his young daughter, pull out a book and read to her on the curb. The little library wasn't enough, so Bart moved a bench from his back yard so that Mike and others could read safely under their sycamore trees. Neighbor John V. took part by painting on the bench "He who reads lives a thousand lives: those who do not. live but one."



In 1901, Andrew Carnegie, the infamous steel magnate of the United States' nineteenth century industrial boom, allotted \$15,000 in donations to construct a new building for the Santa Ana Public Library, on the condition that each year the city raise 15% of the sum of \$1,500 for maintenance purposes. W.H. Spurgeon donated the lot on which the Carnegie Library was to be erected. It was built in a Spanish motif on North Sycamore Street. It withheld the great earthquake of 1933 and wasn't replaced with the current structure until the mid-1950s.

Local Libraries

THE SANTA ANA MAIN PUBLIC LIBRARY

In 1960 when the new Santa Ana Public Library first opened its doors it wasn't just a building, it was the beating heart of a community. Fast forward 64 years and while the structure has seen changes, its heart remains unchanged. Today, it's a bustling hub of learning and innovation, offering everything from tutoring to coding classes. And now, thanks to a whopping \$9.3 million grant, renovations are on the horizon including restoring its marble facade and upgrading essential systems for safety and sustainability.

Children's Library - renovations will include garden illustrations featuring simple geometric forms and vibrant colors to encourage children to play, explore and imagine. Children can create a vibrant garden with unique shapes and textures, while a background mural ignites their imagination. The Library's design is inspired by nature, so kids and their families can learn about the natural world through interactive STREAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) activities. Stay tuned for more updates as they approach the beginning of construction.

Historic Restoration - This part of the renovation project will retain and restore many of the building's significant character-defining features—elements that make a




In the new remodeling of the Santa Ana Library, the rear is turned into a main entrance.

building special and if removed, negatively impact the building's historic integrity. Features to be addressed are, but not limited to;

- Restoration of rear porte cochere
- Restoration of interior stair handrailing and mezzanine guardrail
- Restoration of crown molding in the Main Reading Room
- Rehabilitation of the original Fireplace Room

Floral Park Historic Resources Committee Receives Neighborhood Hero Award

Congratulations to the FPNA historic resources committee, recipients of the 2023 Com Link Neighborhood Hero Award.

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The Neighborhood Hero Award was established in 1997 by the communication linkage forum (Com Link) board as part of the city's neighborhood initiatives and environmental services (NIES) program to honor individuals who have shown sustained commitment and enthusiasm in strengthening the quality of life in their neighborhoods.

On June 22, 2023, Com Link presented 14 Neighborhood Hero awards to community volunteers who were nominated by residents of their neighborhoods. These honorees were selected because each has demonstrated leadership, commitment, generosity, and the selflessness needed to enhance their neighborhood and the greater Santa Ana community.

The Floral Park Neighborhood Association historic resources committee (FPNA HRC) was honored as a recipient of the 2023 Neighborhood Hero Award as outstanding community leaders in recognition of their accomplishment in securing Floral Park's designation as a national historic district.

On February 2, 2023, Floral Park was officially approved as a federal and state-recognized historic district. This would not have happened without the leadership and hard work of the volunteers of the FPNA HRC for the last 15 years. In 2008, the all-volunteer committee undertook the daunting task on behalf of the neighborhood to photograph, document, and catalog each of the neighborhood's 636 homes needed for the state and federal application process.

Those committee members present at the award ceremony were: Beverly L. Schauwecker and James, R. Perez, Julie Humphreys, Erwin Schauwecker, Wayne Suraci, Merle Craig, Ed Murahashie, Jim Taft and Richard Weie.

Nominations are accepted by the Com Link board each spring. Any resident of Santa Ana's 64 neighborhoods can nominate a neighbor for the award. Once the nomination is submitted to the Com Link board, a committee reviews all the entries

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and selects the recipients. Jeff Katz, FPNA board president, serves on the Com Link board.

In addition to the current volunteer members of the committee, we also note with great appreciation the extraordinary accomplishments of Dylan Armendral, Park Santiago resident (noted Santa Ana historian, retained by FPNA as consultant to complete the project). 

This year thanks to the success of last year's home tour (and the generous efforts of everyone involved), FPNA is awarding more money than ever to local non-profits and charitable organizations. Many thanks to all those who submitted nominations for this year's awards.

Following deliberation and vetting by the sponsorship committee, along with board approval, we are pleased to announce that ten nominated charities will each receive an award of \$1,000, for a total of \$10,000, with the request that the funds be used for services rendered in Santa Ana and/or for Santa Ana residents. This will still leave a significant \$30,000 for scholarships our highest amount ever!

The ten organizations represent a variety of causes and services provided, and are predominantly local and/or small.

KidWorks

KidWorks recruits college students (tomorrow's leaders) to serve at-risk youth and families through licensed after-school programs, tutoring, mentoring, college and career readiness, family services and leadership development. It was founded in Santa Ana 30+ years ago and has been able to significantly expand its programs as donations have increased.

WISEPlace is the only OC based nonprofit dedicated to ending homelessness for unaccompanied women. At WISE-Place, the women served often lack the support system of a spouse, significant other, or children; nearly half are disabled, over eighty percent have experienced domestic violence and nearly all have incomes well below the poverty line, all of which put the women served at a greater risk of becoming homeless. In June 2023 WISEPlace broke ground on a new permanent supportive housing development at 1411 North Broadway.
