

City Manager David Cavazos answers “Why Santa Ana?”

We all know why we have chosen Floral Park to be our home. The tree-lined streets, the unique architecture, the friendly neighbors, and the wonderful sense of community our neighborhood has fostered. But why Santa Ana? I, like many of you I am sure, have been asked by well-meaning people what it is like living in Santa Ana. I thought I would sit down with David Cavazos, Santa Ana’s City Manager, to help me better answer that question.

Cavazos is an excited man. He speaks quickly, loudly, and with an enthusiasm for our city I have rarely witnessed. He is proud of the accomplishments Santa Ana has achieved over the past several years. According to Cavazos, Santa Ana is advancing in every key area. “We are seeing an increase in property values, increases in sales tax and increases in business licenses,” he said. Santa Ana’s unemployment rate is down from 10.3% at the high to 4.6% on par with pre-recession rates.

Cavazos points to the activity in downtown, the expansion of the Discovery Science Center, the remodel of the Mainplace Mall and the Auto Mall expansion as examples of Santa Ana’s vibrant economy and business activities.

Design began in January of this year on the OC Street Car. According to Cavazos, “People take the bus because they have to, people take light rail because they want to.” The OC Streetcar, expected to begin operations in 2020, will link the Santa Ana Regional Transportation Center (SARTC), which provides regional rail, OCTA bus, and intercity and international bus services, to a new multimodal hub at Harbor Boulevard/Westminster Avenue

in Garden Grove. The streetcar will serve Downtown Santa Ana along the way, further supporting the economic activity of the city. According to Cavazos, the design will be “sensitive to the character of the community and improve transit accessibility and mobility.”

Cavazos shared with me his long list of goals for Santa Ana but one goal in particular “Improved Quality of Life and Livability,” speaks to some of the concerns our neighbors share. The increasing chatter surrounding our own Jack Fisher Park and the concerns over illegally operating “Pot Shops.”

When asked about Jack Fisher Park, Cavazos stated that he had walked the park recently with a Floral Park resident and he did see some graffiti and litter. He said that the city has, “added two park rangers and there is an increase in off-duty officers patrolling our parks. We have to take back our parks so that bad elements do not feel welcome, we need to use our parks like outdoor living rooms and if there is anything wrong we need to report it.”

In regards to illegal marijuana dispensaries, “the City’s Enforcement Task Force, a team of 11, has successfully closed 87 out of 109 and it is ramping up enforcement and is committed to shutting down the remaining dispensaries within the next six months,” he said. “Where there is a legitimate need our city is committed to serving that need by moving the dispensaries away from our neighborhoods, schools and parks to industrial areas under the supervision of the Medical Marijuana Task Force.”

Santa Ana is a dynamic, thriving, diverse city with many great things happening. While it is often easy to focus on some of the less desirable aspects of our home it is evident that there is much about which to be excited and encouraged.

2016 HOME & GARDEN TOUR

Normally, at this time, I bring you up to date on how the annual Floral Park and Garden Tour is shaping up. But, I will deviate from that because of our perennial last-minute need for docents. Without them, we simply could not hold the Tour.

Thus, the Home Tour Committee is making a special and urgent plea to help. We're approaching a quarter century of conducting the Home Tour (in 2017) and want to begin setting the stage for the grand event. We want you to become involved this year to assure that we have the best possible welcome to our visitors.

This is YOUR opportunity to give back to YOUR community.

There is no experience necessary. Shifts are from 10 – 1 and 1 - 4 on Saturday and Sunday, April 23 and 24. This leaves you plenty of time to visit the houses on tour with your free entrance for being a docent.

But, I want to especially highlight the fact that nearly half of our docents come from outside Floral Park per se. For example, last year we needed 424 docents. Would you believe that 200 docents came from elsewhere?

Let's support our Community as others support us as well.

We want to highlight the many years of work our docents do by listing those who have five or more years with us and who were docents on the 2015 Home Tour. Please note how many came from outside Floral Park.

Thank you all, both FP residents and our loyal supporters.

And, watch for your invitation coming soon in the mail.

associate of arts and launched her life in food preparation. Her apprenticeship was spent at the Ritz Carlton where she worked for eight years. (Eight years as an apprentice? Wow, that's one long run!)

Consequently, she decided she needed to leave the 70-hour workweek and found another pursuit as one of the first food preparation demonstrators at Trader Joe's. Now, to call her work "food demonstration" is ridiculously simplistic. She was, as Richard pointed out when we spent an evening with them, a real creative force behind what we now expect when we walk by the demonstration area at any TJ's.

Always using only products sold in the store, Mila waved her magic wand, calling upon all of her life experience to develop amazing new approaches to what customers buy there every day.

Why does Richard know how well she did? Well, it turns out that he hired her.

Second part of story: Richard is now tied with his best friend as the second longest-serving employee at Trader Joe's. And, he's tied with his best friend, he says.

Currently manager of the Trader Joe's at UC Irvine, he has operated or worked at many, if not most, of the TJs in Orange County to include Costa Mesa (which he opened), Newport Coast, and Fullerton.

So, when he met Mila, who was peddling her roasted tomatoes for inclusion in the TJ product line, Richard saw a genius. He was looking for someone to expand the TJ experience. He jokingly said she was looking for a husband. As it turned out, both got what they were looking for!

Although we had sampled Mila's cooking at neighborhood events such as mixers and other social activities, we had never actually taken advantage of her catering expertise. As often happens, exigency brings opportunity. In our case, it was Christmas past, on the occasion of the annual Floral Park Holiday Celebration. Sandy was to be busy with assuring the neighborhood's supply of snow. But, we were also scheduled to attend the holiday concert at Cal State Fullerton before which eight of us friends would have dinner beforehand. Where to eat would typically fall to yours truly.

Our dilemma was how to squeeze in a restaurant dinner between the neighborhood celebration and the start of the concert. The solution: call on Chef Mila to work her magic. And, believe me, she did.

Her signature dish is her short ribs. They are beyond incredibly delicious. Fall-off-the-bone delicious. She told me that it's an adaptation of a recipe from a well-known Napa Valley restaurant. So, of course, we had to order those.

Where the Sidewalk Ends:

The Poems and Drawings of Shel Silverstein, 1974

We all have our magic places in life, as you know. Sandy and I "discovered" a new one recently right where Shel Silverstein said it would be: where the sidewalk ends. Well, at least *our* sidewalk, that is. I see it every morning when I retrieve my newspapers from the driveway, a quarter mile south of us.

The rest of you do, too, as you enter Floral Park on 19th and make the first stop at Victoria. There, to your left, reside Mila and Richard Payne, two Merlins of the culinary scene, but quite different in their particular legerdemain.

So, let me weave you a few tales.

Richard and Mila moved to Floral Park just over two years ago. They bought a wonderfully restored Craftsman that FP resident Richard Chiarini and some partners brought back to life smack at the end of Victoria on the south side of 19th. The Paynes took it from there, producing an almost fairyland-like yard and garden.

Mila, who came to the United States from her native Brazil as an adult, brought with her a family experience in the grocery business as her father was the proprietor of a store that, among other things, purveyed her father's trade with nearby fishermen in Parati, Brazil, about 300 miles east of Salvador.

For a decade and a half, she was a flight attendant with now-defunct VASP, a state-owned and operated airline headquartered in Sao Paulo. Ultimately, she relocated to Santa Monica.

After moving to Orange County, she enrolled in the culinary arts program at Orange Coast College where she earned her

But, I asked her what would be a classic Brazilian Christmas dish. She immediately responded, “Oh, *bacalhau*, of course.” Since I had asked, I was getting somewhat committed.

“What’s that?” I inquired.

“Cod,” she answered. “Salt cod, in fact.”

Now, I know just enough about cod to understand that it’s a cold water fish, particularly prevalent in Nordic countries. There, it’s often called *lutefisk* (literally, lye fish). I have tasted it once and I must say that it borders on disgusting, as even most of my Norwegian-American friends would agree.

So, ironically enough, three of the six fellow attendees at the concert were of Norwegian or Icelandic extraction.

Now, I pondered, how did a salt cod dish make its way to Brazil? There simply isn’t any cold water nearby.

It turns out that the Portuguese, who colonized Brazil some 500 years ago, were beginning to trade in the commodity, most likely as a result of contact with the Vikings. It’s back to those Norwegians again.

So, when our friends arrived for the pre-concert dinner, we sprang on them not only Mila’s short ribs but her *bacalhau*. I told the gathered group that we had Brazilian *lutefisk* on offer. Skeptical looks abounded. But it took just one taste to transform skepticism to enthusiasm. It was magnificent! She had won over a whole new cadre of converts. In fact, I suspect this will become an annual tradition. And, she had made so much that we were able to share it the next evening with my daughter’s family and it was even better.

But, the story continues. Recently, I was telling a visiting old friend and his wife about the Brazilian chef down the street and her *bacalhau*.

An accomplished and adventurous cook himself, he wondered why she might not have suggested *feijoada*, a Brazilian stew of beans with beef and pork. So, subsequently, I asked her.

Her response? “Come by and I’ll make you some.”

Well, just a week or so ago, she did. Sandy and I were the guests of Mila and Richard for a dinner of *feijoada* (pronounced roughly as FAY-ZHO-AH-DAH). It was divine. She combined short ribs, pork ribs, and chicken Italian sausage with the black beans in an incredible sauce. Oh, my, what a meal.

Further, she accompanied it with some *picanha*, a cut of beef frequently used in Brazilian barbecue and taken from just in front of the tail. Served medium rare, it was a rare treat indeed. And, a yucca flour concoction and a serving of kale with bacon, garlic, and olive oil completed the main course. Before that we had Brazilian cheese balls that were absolutely evil in their richness of flavor. We finished off the meal with a simple but elegant salad of Bibb lettuce, olives, and mini-Kumato tomatoes.

And, of course, we sampled one of Trader Joe’s great wine values, a 2009 own-label cabernet that one can no longer find in the store.

But, Mila’s skills extend beyond the kitchen. She’s a painter as well. In fact, she’s combined her artistry with her culinary skills to produce her own cookbooks complete with an original hand-painted cover for each book as well as a range of greeting cards. They’re available at Rogers Garden in Newport Beach and The Potting Shed in Orange or I’m sure you can make arrangements with her for yours. I bought my treasured copies at her Christmas bazaar in December. The books make ample use of Trader Joe’s ingredients as well.

Frankly, I could write twice as much about this ebullient couple. They are an absolutely delightful addition to the neighborhood. You’ll see Mila walking her dog twice a day around Floral Park. She loves to chat. And, since we can’t divulge every-

thing about Trader Joe, talk with Richard at one of the social events to get his take on Trader Joe and if and when they might make a return to Santa Ana. One never knows. And, even though she’s trying not to overdo it on the catering business, I suspect Mila could squeeze in just one more Floral Park client!

If you are contacted the reporting procedure recommended by the IRS is to go to the Treasury inspector general website <https://treasury.gov/tigta/> to report the activity.

The Treasury inspector general for tax administration; J. Russel George, says "It is critical that all taxpayers continue to be wary of unsolicited telephone calls and emails from individuals claiming to be IRS and Treasury employees."



Gracie, the Read-To Dog

Rich and Tammy Heider moved to Floral Park January 2013. Tammy and Gracie the Yorkie (a registered therapy Dog), have been volunteering for five years at John Adams Elementary school in Santa Ana assisting and encouraging the students to embrace reading in a relaxed atmosphere where the students read their books aloud to Gracie.

In October of 2012, Tammy had heard of a lovely neighborhood somewhere in Santa Ana. One day after the reading program, Gracie and her Mommy drove from school and ended up finding Floral Park. The weekend after Thanksgiving, Rich and Tammy went to an open house in both FP & WFP and put in an offer for the FP home the following day. Offer was accepted and they moved in the first week of January.

Gracie and Tammy have been a registered therapy dog team for eight years with Delta Society Pet Partners. Volunteer locations include visiting patients at Mission Hospital, school reading programs, Disability awareness days at elementary schools, Dr. Seuss Read Across America events, senior day care centers, nursing and assisted living homes and court awarded teen group homes. After moving to FP, Tammy saw a flyer for the annual Santa Ana Library's Children's Book Faire event in April. Out of curiosity, Tammy called the library to inquire about the event and asked if they had a reading dog that visited the library for storytelling time. The answer was no! Tammy proceeded to explain the READ (Reading Educational Assistance Dogs) program to the head of the Children's department and asked if they would be open to having a booth at the Book Faire where the children could read a book to the dog. About a week later, the library director called and said they would love to have Gracie at the event. It was such a hit with the kids and their parents, the library asked if Tammy and Gracie would be interested in joining a Saturday storytelling time to see how the community would embrace it. The children's department created a flyer advertising Gracie the Read-To Dog. The room was filled with families with kids from infants to 5th graders wanting to read to and pet Gracie. The hour long session included doing a fun craft too. Well, one month turned into two which lead to adding an additional day at the New Hope library branch.

Fast forward 2 years later you will find Tammy & Gracie volunteering every month at both branches filled with families waiting to read with Gracie. The library is under the Parks and Recreation department. Every month, all divisions assigned to Parks and Recreation nominates a volunteer for a community service award to someone who serves the residents of Santa Ana. The library staff nominated Tammy & Gracie and the Board Members with Recreation and Parks voted them as the month of March 2015 recipient. A commemorative plaque was presented at the April Board of Director's awards ceremony and meeting.

Tammy would enjoy seeing her neighborhood children at the next storytelling time with Gracie. Bring kids of all ages even if they are too young to read on the last Saturday of any month at 10:30 am. The kids get a picture card of Gracie, a sticker for reading and make a craft to take home. Come on down and tell them you are from the hood!




